

What is the purpose of a business partnership?

Naperville Community Unit School District 203 is comprised of 21 schools and over 19,000 students, making it the fifth largest school district in Illinois. Our Business Partnership program is supported and endorsed by the District 203 Board of Education and the local Chambers of Commerce.

Business Community Education Partnerships have been part of the educational fabric in America since the time of Eli Whitney (1790's). Recognizing the economic benefit of a skilled population, businesses continue to partner with schools today. A Business Community Education Partnership is designed to be mutually beneficial. A partnership may provide direct support to student activities, instruction enrichment or staff support/development.

Business partners have the unique opportunity to make a direct impact on students in their own community. What better return on an investment in our shared future?



- Identify ways the partnership can support the curriculum in the school/district
- Outline mission, goals and objectives, as well as related curricular activities
- Schedule an informal ceremony for partnership signing
- Encourage feedback at the end of the year/project and remember to celebrate
