The following is a brief skills/experience requirements description of some of our more popular volunteer programs that are currently available in our schools.

MENTORING

Want to make a direct impact on one student? This program will allow you to use your skills/experience to help students better manage their time, organize their studies, and to be more motivated. You may have to do a little “light” tutoring, but more in-depth tutoring is available, if the student requires it.

TUTORING

Have a specific or unique skill or experience you could share with a student? Math, science or computer technology are just a few of the areas where you could make a contribution. You will work one-on-one or with a small group of students at all grade levels who need help in your area of expertise. The people who most enjoy tutoring are those with special or unique interests and skills who prefer to specialize in their area of expertise rather than participate in the more general activities of mentoring.

READERS

Enjoy fine literature? Many of our elementary schools have reading programs where you can share your love of reading, help our students to appreciate good literature, and to improve their vocabulary. The “Give the Gift of Reading program” is one of our most appreciated programs and gives our students a positive role model who is demonstrating the importance of reading. The volunteers who enjoy participating in this program share a love of reading with a love of children.

CLASSROOM PARTICIPATION

If you have a special skill, hobby, or experience you would be willing to share with our students in a classroom, there are opportunities available. We have had guest instructors who have discussed the stock market and another who discussed the art of negotiation. We have also had World War II veterans discuss their real life experiences as part of our curriculum on World War II. This could also include travel or other real life experiences. If you would like to interact with a group of students in your specific area of interest or expertise, this could be the right vehicle for you.

MISCELLANEOUS

This could include administrative support, the availability to accompany our teachers and students on field trips active as laboratory assistance, working on special projects, etc. This might be the right area for people who want to help in some way, but who have scheduling problems or who would just not be comfortable working in any of the previously mentioned programs.
