Home & School President Report

Eye on Springfield

There are many people and organizations that have varying effects on our children's education. We as parents hopefully have the largest effect, followed by the teachers and rest of the people working in our school district. One other large group that has a significant input on our kids' education works down in Springfield and consists of our friendly State Representatives, Senators, and the Governor.

The reason I mention them right now is because as I write this in mid-November, our state legislature is considering a bill, HB 750, which will have a huge effect on the entire educational system in Illinois, as well as your pocket book. And the interesting thing is, nobody seems to know about it.

HB 750 is a bill that totally restructures education funding in our state. If passed, it will attempt to decrease our reliance on local property taxes and shift a higher percentage to state income taxes. Some of the major changes include:

- Creates the "School District Property Tax Relief Fund" The General Assembly shall appropriate \$2.4 billion to this special fund with the intent of refunding approximately 20% of the property taxes we pay for schools.
- Increases income tax rate for individuals from 3% to 5% Estimated to raise approximately \$5 billion.
- Increases income tax rate for corporations from 4.8% to 8% Estimated to raise approximately \$491 million.
- Includes retirement income in taxable income for individuals with an adjusted gross income over \$75,000
- Increases the foundation level in the school funding formula to \$5,952 in the first year of the law's enactment In subsequent years, the foundation level would increase by the rate of the Employment Cost Index (ECI). The estimated cost of this provision is \$1.8 billion.

There are additional smaller changes, but those are the big ones and the bottom line is that this bill would significantly change how our public schools are funded in Illinois.

Now there are pros and cons to this bill, and of course many supporters and opponents. I'm staying far away from those arguments here. But this bill, whether in passing or by not passing, will have a great effect on our schools for years to come. That's why I believe it is vital for us as parents, taxpayers, and citizens, to be informed and make our opinions heard. Our State Legislators will listen to you (I hope), but you have to let them know your feelings.

I urge you to take a few minutes and learn about this bill. A Google search for Illinois HB 750 will give you more than enough information. Then let your representatives know how you feel. There's a good chance that this bill will only be acted upon next year in the new session, so there's time to let your voice be heard. After all, we are talking about our kids, our money, and our schools.

preparing for the Autumn Concerts. On Tuesday,
November 16 the MJHS Bands will perform. The sixth
grade band will perform a fun piece called, Stick It!, featuring the percussion section. Come see the first appearance of the Madison 6th grade band perform this fun
piece. The 7th grade band will be performing a highly

ORGANIZATION, STUDY SKILLS AND GOALS

It is never too late to organize and set new goals and we have two more spectacular trimesters left. Students may need their parents' help with reinforcing good organizational and study habits. What can you to do help your son/daughter? Here are a few suggestions you might try:

- Get a supply of stickers (yes, middle school students really do still like stickers) and each night the assignment notebook has been filled out, put a sticker on it. Maybe you can come up with a small incentive for a week's worth of stickers, etc.
- If poor organization skills create issues at your hometry to get the expandable file folder in order by creating a separate file for each subject. When in class simply pull out the subject file needed.
- Clean out folders/binders weekly. Help organize materials; recycle old papers, re-fill supplies. (If he/she is not sure whether to recycle a paper or not, keep a special folder at home with the questionable work. That way if it turns out it is needed, it will be accessible.)
- Go to the Madison Student Links page on the web site and investigate different links that might enhance certain subjects. For example, there are some great math links that are specifically designed for the middle school student and our curriculum.
- Study Skills Websites: There are several websites that give suggestions for anything from scheduling time to

- preparing for tests. These sites might be of some interest and help. (ex: http://www.keene.edu/aspire/obj.cfm)
- Keep language arts reading calendars on the refrigerator or posted somewhere where they will be visual reminders to keep up with the reading schedule.
- Make an after school/homework schedule with a time grid and fill it out ahead of time. Make sure to include a snack break and of course a dinner break, but try to keep the time pretty consistent. This really will help keep a routine going. Again, the visual aspect is so helpful.
- Remind students to use as many "at school" resources as they can. For example: sixth graders have an opportunity to attend the Lunch Bunch Club during 5th period lunch where they can eat while doing homework. Seventh and eighth graders who have lunch 4th period have a Lunch Homework Club available during that lunch period for extra homework time as well. They can see their teachers or Mrs. Lints for details about these clubs. Students can also work in the LRC and computer lab after school.

Other suggestions are available from Mrs. Lints, who runs the Academic Support program. The program is for any student who might need some assistance in maintaining success in their academic classes.

IT'S JUST AROUND THE CORNER

In December, Eighth graders will spend two days in the computer lab working with DISCOVER, a comprehensive career exploration program. They will complete three inventories designed to stimulate their thinking about their Interests, Abilities, and Values. Their results then are compared with those of people actively engaged in thousands of different careers, and the students are provided with information on the World-of-Work map. This map uses Holland's theory of careers to help students see how their results relate to the six types of careers: Investigative (Thinker), Enterprising (Persuasive), Artistic (Creative), Conventional (Organization), Social (Helper), and Realistic (Doer). In addition, DISCOVER lists high school coursework related to each career path.

The computer room activity lays the foundation for the students to begin thinking about high school course selection. Shortly after we return from Winter Break, counselors and administrators from Naperville Central High School will meet with 8th graders to distribute important information about the registration process. Materials include the Freshman Guide, a booklet listing all courses open to freshman; and the complete Course Listing of all NCHS classes.

You will receive information in January about the evening Freshman Family Orientation program offered at NCHS and the specific dates for registration. Your child's 8th grade teachers will complete a course recommendation form that will be an excellent guide for the courses that will be most appropriate for your child. You will be asked to review the recommendations, sign, and return to form to Madison. We consistently receive feedback from the Naperville Central staff that those students who are the most successful are those who have followed the recommendations of their Madison teachers. In mid to late February, your child's high school counselor will come to Madison to register your child for those classes.

We look forward to helping everyone make a successful transition to high school. If you have questions about the DISCOVER program or courses recommended for your child, please feel free to contact the 8th grade counselor, Mrs. Patrice Olinger, at 420-6401.
