 the ensuing year and at the same time winding down and celebrating the completion of an important period in your children's educational experience. In essence we have been reflecting on the past, while living in the present and thinking about the future. It is my hope that every child has had a year balanced with experimentation, affirmation, and adventure!

Reflecting on the Past

Our theme "Staying on course for a winning year!" emphasized the use of data to *drive*/guide instruction. A number of assessments "for" and "of" learning were administered (i.e. fall writing assessments, Rigby Reading Placement Assessments, and trimester math tests). Not only did teachers use *data to stay on course*, but so did our students. Teachers have been setting clear goals and communicating learning targets with their students by creating and implementing student friendly rubrics (assessments). The 6 Traits Writing Framework, is being used by our teachers as part of the new literacy program. Teachers in all grade levels have engaged students in the writing process by giving them the opportunity to assess writing models, looking for strong and weak elements. This instructional practice has been most effective! I look forward to reviewing their writing portfolios that contains compositions they have completed over time.

This year has been packed full of new initiatives to support our School Improvement Plan (SIP). Our 2003-04 SIP focused on increasing student achievement in the areas of literacy and school climate. The School/Family/Community Partnership Committee has done an outstanding job implementing our Breakfast with Brooks Program. This program provided the opportunity for children to experience positive reading interactions by sharing good literature (and food) with good role models (grandparents, dads and high school athletes). I would like to thank our school business partner, Home Run Inn Pizza, and community retailers (Costco and Krispy Krème) for supporting this program.

To assess school climate, we administered the Manners Matrix (bully survey). The data indicated a need to establish clear "bully rules" and provide effective strategies to assist students in dealing with difficult relationships. Mrs. McIntire is currently training all teachers on how to conduct weekly class meetings

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that address these issues. Some of our teachers have already implemented class meetings this year. Next year all teachers will conduct class meetings.

A Peer Relations Committee has been formed and has been working on the rules. The committee is comprised of parents and staff. The Student Council has been our vehicle in collecting student feedback. Parent, student and teacher input has all been very insightful and valuable in addressing our concerns.

Looking into the future

By the time you receive this letter, I will have concluded my parent conferences regarding concerns over next year's placement. Your input is important and will be shared with teachers as we move forward in the placement process. During the month of May, placement meetings will be conducted. Both the current and ensuing teacher(s) for your child will attend the meeting with me. It is our goal to create the best learning environment for each and every student. We appreciate the positive notes and kind words you have extended to us as we determine your child's placement. Thank you for your trust and confidence.

Staff changes occur every year due to retirements, relocations, and expanding families. We have three people retiring this year: Mr. Kroger (art), Mrs. Ebeling (2nd), and Mrs. Reese (health tech). Mr. Kroger has been at Maplebrook almost since they opened. Mrs. Ebeling has ben a kindergarten, first and second grade teacher here at Maplebrook for the past 12 years. Mrs. Reese has served Maplebrook for the past 18 years. Other people leaving Maplebrook are: Mrs. Patti McIntire (school social worker), Mrs. Margaret Caldwell (Learning Resource Teacher), Mrs. Jennifer Bjorkman (kindergarten), and Mr. Bob Matejcak (psychologist). All but Mrs. Bjorkman are transferring to different schools in the District. Mrs. Bjorkman is relocating to Michigan.

We will miss these dedicated individuals who have made positive contributions to Maplebrook Elementary School. We wish them well in their new endeavors. (Staff replacements will be announced in the fall.)

In addition to the staff changes noted above, we would like to welcome our student teachers that will be joining us in the fall. Kristen Levato a North Central student, will be joining Mrs. Barak (4th grade), and Kyle Padia a student from Northern Illinois University, will be joining Mr. Moores (PE). Other staff changes include Ms. Peterson moving to second grade and Ms. McCubbin moving to first grade.

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Class Notes — The Sounds of Learning...

KINDERGARTEN

Our Kindergartners wish to say, "Hola, Amigos!" to express their delight in learning about Mexico! The boys and girls in Mexico City are a lot like us! We celebrated connections, as well as differences! Learning about seeds and plants help prepare us for our Red Oak Nature Center field trip! Every day we celebrate all that we've learned in reading, writing, and math throughout the year! We look forward to "flying up" to First Grade soon, just to get a glimpse of what next year will be like!

THIRD GRADE

With testing over, third grade is really enjoying their learning! We are deep into our social studies unit of Japan and will finish off the year studying medieval Europe and their community systems. In late April we enjoyed a presentation from a Naperville woman of Japanese heritage. During our Medieval Unit, each child will be creating their own personal shield.

Our reading/science unit of People and Animals has us learning and researching wolves. We're hoping to have a visit from John Basil, who we lovingly have named "The Wolf Man." Also, as part of the unit we will be observing the behavior of rolly pollies and using the scientific method to find out their food, habitat and terrain preferences.

Our last math units will be measurement and division. Remember, measurement is most meaningful when used in real life, so if the opportunity presents itself, have your child measure liquids, weight and lengths when possible! Division will cover only the concept and facts. No need to worry about "long division" this year.

We're all looking forward to the warm weather and finishing up the year on a positive note! Please continue to turn in Reading Logs and sign assignment books. We hate to end the year with children not remaining responsible for their homework and school obligations.

FOURTH GRADE

Do you think the 4th graders are square? We actually have an angle for everything!! Our math lessons all geometry these days and we're feeling very competent.

The excitement emanating from 4^{th} grade these days is due to the excellent plants that we're growing in the classrooms. Our Wisconsin Fast Plants provide us with a 6 - week life cycle and an immersion course in botany.

We travel to the desert SW through fiction, research, history, geography, and art. We employ the hardest, most sophisticated strategies in literacy during this time.

Our literary finale is an all pod novel study with our favorite books. The children will choose their novels and visit other classes and possibly have other teachers for this experience. We all really like this.
