Daniel was one of only seven of 20,500 Illinois students and one of only 33 of 380,000 in the nation who took the ACT in June to achieve this score.

I encourage you to support and attend the many sports and activities hosted at Naperville North High School. Our students work extremely hard to "put their best foot forward" in the auditorium, gym, stadium, etc. Included in each Howler will be a listing of upcoming events. Dear Parents:

Once again, a new school year is upon us, and the deans' office would like to take this opportunity to share behavioral expectations and discipline procedures as outlined in your son's/daughter's student handbook.

To begin, each class has been assigned a specific dean who is responsible for the enforcement of school guidelines. During the school year, please do not hesitate to contact the appropriate administrator with any questions. The number is 420-6505.

Because it is our responsibility to promote every student's ability to become a self-directed learner, as well as a positive contributor to the community, the following rules and regulations will be **strictly enforced:**

- Attendance Procedures: Please call in all absences by 11:00 AM on the day your son or daughter will not be in attendance. The number is 420-6982.
- Tardy Policy: Students are expected to be in class when the bell rings. Please note that on the fifth tardy, students will be referred to and consequenced by the deans' office.
- Truancy Policy: According to city ordinance that was passed in 2001, students may be ticketed and fined for excessive truancies. Students will also receive school consequences for all truancies, which may include being withdrawn from class
- **Dress Code:** In order to better facilitate student learning, students will be expected to dress appropriately for school. An explanation of the dress code, including specific examples, can be found on pages 20 and 21 of the new student handbook.
- **Detention Schedule:** Student dispositions can range from one-hour detentions before school (6:30 7:30 AM Tuesday- Friday) to 1-4 hour detentions (8:00 AM 12 noon) on Saturdays. Social suspensions, out-of-school suspensions, inschool suspensions, and expulsions are reserved for more serious offenses.

As always, it is the office goal to partner with parents and the community as we encourage and guide our youth toward success. We thank you in advance for your continued support as we strive to promote a positive learning environment that adheres to the Vision of District 203.

From the Nurse's Office



District 203 has a no carry medication policy. This policy includes over the counter products such as Tylenol, cough syrup, and eye drops. The only exception is for inhalers for

treatment of asthma. For all medications, whether over the counter or prescription (including inhalers for asthma), we require a prescription from the doctor as well as a signed note from the parent/guardian before we can dispense a medication or a student can bring an asthma inhaler to school. We have the necessary forms in the health office.

Illinois school law mandates that all freshmen present a current physical signed by a physician licensed to practice medicine in order to gain school admission. Because of the law, it is required that freshmen present this physical in order to register. There will be no exceptions to this requirement and schedules will not be distributed until it is met.

Freshmen athletes will need to make a copy of their freshmen physical to turn in for sports registration as well.

Talk203 Naperville North

DEBIT CARD NEWS FROM SODEXHO

The debit system is an easy and convenient way to pay for meals and snacks at school. A student merely makes a deposit to a personal account then each time a purchase is made in the cafeteria, the student's ID is swiped and the amount of the sale is automatically deducted from the account balance.

Seeds of Peace had only 30 spaces available, in the U.S., for this program and had received 200 applications from around the country. Derek was chosen as one of five young leaders to represent the State of Illinois.

Sixty participants, representing America and the Arab World, met at the Seeds of Peace International Camp in Maine from August 14-30. "They were given the opportunity to meet face-to-face, reach common ground, discuss complex issues facing the global community, and to receive the training required to lead in all aspects of their society." They will reunite in Jordan, in March 2005, and be exposed to life in an Arab country and again meet to further their discussions.
